Task 1

The science fiction writer, Frederic Brown, is credited to write the shortest story in the world in 1948, which he called "Knock". The story was this: "The last man on ~~ear~~ Earth sat alone in a room. There was a knock on the door". The story paved the way to a new fashion of writing very short stories.

The whole idea of writing such stories, which still have a setting, characters, a conflict, and a resolution, seems awkward but oddly captivating. In 1987 an editor of "New Times", Steve Moss, established "55 Fiction", a literature competition. All of the entries were required to ~~be~~ consist of fifty-five words or less while ~~was~~ preserving all of the necessary story components. The best works ~~was~~ were published ~~in~~ as a book "The World's Shortest Stories" "The World's Shortest Stories of Love and Death" in 1999. <sup>77</sup>

One of the stories in the book - "The Search" - tells ~~to~~ readers about a journey to find the Truth. It is portrayed as an ugly old woman, whose only message to the world is to tell everybody that she is young and beautiful. A lot of ink was spilled on writing about searching for the truth, but the clarity and the depth of this piece are certain to leave a trace in readers' minds. <sup>79</sup>

Other stories <sup>80</sup> may not be so deep in comparison, but they will definitely give readers a good laugh. What distinguishes them from ordinary jokes is a hint of meaning, something you can ponder on. I think that these great works will hold readers' attention for longer than thirty seconds - the amount of time you ~~are~~ need to read them.
