

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Task 1

The science fiction writer, Frederic Brown, is credited to write the shortest story in the world in 1948, which he called "Knock". The story was this: "The last man on Earth sat alone in a room. There was a knock on the door." The story paved the way to a new fashion of writing very short stories /with a plot twist at the end. THE WORLD'S SHORTEST STORIES OF LOVE AND DEATH by Steve Moss is a collection of some of the best of these stories.

The stories published in the book were entries ~~in~~ a competition called 55 FICTION, which ~~is~~ runs annually in the American magazine NEW TIMES. A literary work is considered 55 FICTION if it has one or more characters, a setting, some conflict, a resolution and, of course, no more than fifty-five words. Surprisingly, even under these constraints it's possible to create many exciting, amusing and tragic stories.

One of the saddest stories in the book is GRATITUDE by Andrew E. Hunt, which is about a homeless man who is grateful for what he has. Unlike many other depressing stories I've read, GRATITUDE ~~has not come to me yet~~. Another thought-provoking story is HIGHER EDUCATION by Ron Bast, which makes the readers think about the importance of college education in modern society. However, some of the stories are more humorous, such as IN THE GARDEN by Hope A. Torres, which uses some wordplay and ends ~~with~~ a clever punchline. All of the stories in the book have one thing in common: they manage to fit an entire meaningful storyline into just 55 words.

In my opinion, THE WORLD'S SHORTEST STORIES OF LOVE AND DEATH is well worth reading. Because the stories are so short, you won't have to memorize a million different characters or a complicated plot. Despite this, it leaves a lasting impression. The book is

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beautiful in its simplicity, which is why it remains one of my favorite books.

Were I to sum up THE WORLD'S SHORTEST STORIES OF LOVE AND DEATH by Steve Moss in one word, it would be stunning. I recommend this book to fans of short stories or to anyone who is looking for something unusual to read! /
