The science fiction writer, Frederic Brown, is credited to write the shortest story in the world in 1948, which he called "Knock". The story was this: "The last man on Earth sat alone in a room. There was a knock on the door." The story paved the way to a new fashion of writing very short stories, the best of which are included in "The World's Shortest Stories of Love ~~and Death~~ by Steve Moss" by Steve Moss.

In 1987, as an editor of the New Times, Steve Moss started "55 Fiction". Annually, the participants of this competition send their work <sup>annually</sup> to the magazine. Their stories must have fifty-five or less words, a setting, characters, a problem and a resolution. In 1999, Steve Moss gathered his favourite pieces of work and published them in "The World's Shortest Stories of Love and Death".

Many published stories have an unexpected ending. For example, in "Higher Education", Jennings says that he did not receive a proper education and then the reader discovers that he is a doctor. Additionally, in the short story "In the Garden", Tom is not calling Tina his flower, but trying to tell her that she is standing on his rose. Furthermore, several literary works contain a sort of sad humour. Examples of this can be found in "The Search" and in "Gratitude". The latter is about a homeless man who enjoys his life and in the former, Truth, the ugliest woman the main character had ever seen says her message is that she is young and beautiful!

Reading the ~~stories~~ book, at first I found the stories hilarious and laughed many times. However, rereading them I began seeing the depressing truths hidden behind the humour.
