The science fiction writer Frederic Brown is credited to write the

shortest story in the world in 1948 which he called "Knock". The story was this: "The last man on Earth sat alone. There was a knock at the door. The story paved the way

to a new fashion of writing very short stories. Nearly forty years later Steve Moss, an editor of the magazine "New Times", ran a contest asking readers to submit stories matching the following criteria: Firstly, there must be a setting with at least one

character. Secondly, there should be some kind of a conflict which must be resolved by the end of the story. Finally, the most important and, by far, the ~~hardest~~ hardest part was that a story containing all the above must not consist of more than 55 words. "55 Fiction" as Moss called the competition proved to be a success, lasting to the present day. The subject of this review is Moss's compilation of the best such short stories named "The World's Shortest Stories of Love and Death" published in 1999. Honestly, I doubted that one

Instead of hiding the writer's talent, the format makes it clearer. It takes a lot of creativity to ~~get an~~ come up with a good plot, and ~~a lot of thought must be put into~~ one must weed out any superficial word, leaving only the indispensable ones. <sup>definite</sup>

But it is clear that every story is a true gem: some, like "Gratitude" or "Higher Education" address moral dilemmas and social issues respectively, really making you think of that, while others like "In the Garden" are some of the funniest ever written.
